Robyn Muncy is Professor of History at the University of Maryland, College Park, where she has taught US women's history and twentieth-century US history since 1990. She is author of *Creating a Female Dominion in American Reform*, 1890-1935 (Oxford UP, 1991) and *Relentless Reformer: Josephine Roche and Progressivism in Twentieth-Century America* (Princeton UP, 2015). In 2019, she co-curated an exhibit on the struggle for women's suffrage at the National Archives in Washington, DC. She also served on the advisory board for a project sponsoring historical markers in all 50 US states, commemorating the history of American women's struggle for the franchise.
